Attendance requirements for Students Years 7-11 during Term 4 2011

With school staff involved in school development days at the end of Term 4 in 2011, students in Years 7, 8, 9 and 11 are required to attend school <u>until</u> the third last day of Term 4 -Friday 16 December 2011.

For students in <u>Year 10</u>, the Board of Studies will issue award documents on 8 December for those students who have met the requirements for the School Certificate.

With the new school leaving age, students in Year 10, who have not reached 17 years of age, <u>are required to attend</u> <u>school until the third last day</u> <u>of Term 4 - Friday 16 December</u> <u>2011.</u>

Year 10 students who can demonstrate that they are leaving school to enter into full-time permanent employment and will not be resuming their studies at school in 2012 are able to leave school after the award of the School Certificate, provided they have completed all their clearance obligations with the school. Students needing to leave school earlier should apply to the principal for an exemption.

MAKING SENSE OF GEN Y - NEXGEN GROUP

Michael McQueen is a national and international researcher, author of books and presenter of seminars and workshops on Gen Y (12-30 year olds). He is based in Sydney and has presented to WHS students in the past along with over 80,000 other high school students across Australia.

His seminar in Taree last week highlighted current research and confirmed other findings on Gen Y. He also gave some insights on trends emerging with Gen Z (0-11 year olds)

Gen Y currently makeup less than 14% of the workforce and by 2020 they will make up 42%.

Some highlights of his seminar were:

He identified some of the myths or misconceptions about Gen Y that have resulted from perceptions and filtering of information by those in the older generations. The ''Why aren't they like we were?'' syndrome.

He also noted their positive qualities of: Well educated; flexible, tech savvy; natural networking abilities; and confidence.

He did highlight the fact that Gen Y are Tech addicts and described the observed withdrawal behaviours - both psychological and physical when a sample group had their mobile phones removed from them in a technological void environment. Conclusion ADDICTION CONFIRMED.

Some good advice on how to get the best out of Gen Y

1: Prioritise the relationship - they care about relationships but don't care how much you know until they know how much you care. - Be authentic and interested.

 Focus on Outcomes and Process - Relevance of outcomes and question the process.

3. Adopt the role of Coach use small chunks of knowledge
and information; expect
continuous improvement; set
short term not long term goals
- 5 year plans are out . Best
scenario is 5 day to 5 minute
plans.

Helping someone with depression

It's not always easy to help someone who may be experiencing depression. It can be hard to know what to say or do. Here are some tips.

Talk to the person about how they're feeling.

Listen to what they're saying – sometimes, when a person wants to talk, they're not always seeking advice, but just need to talk about their concerns. Make it clear they have your full attention and you are listening properly. You may like to save any suggestions for a later discussion.

Maintain eye contact and sit in a relaxed position – positive body language will help you both feel more comfortable.

Use open-ended questions such as 'So tell me about...?', which require more than a 'yes' or 'no' answer. This is often a good way to start a conversation.

If your conversation becomes difficult or the person you're talking to gets angry, stay calm, be firm, fair and consistent, admit if you are wrong and don't lose control.

Often, just **spending time with the person** lets them know you care and can help you understand what they're going through.

Encourage the person to seek professional help from their family doctor or a mental health worker.

Take care of yourself. Supporting someone with depression can be demanding, so make sure you take some time out to look after yourself.

Practical ways to help someone with depression

People with depression often don't see the point of doing anything and may feel that no one can really help them. Helping someone who isn't ready to recognise they need assistance may be very difficult.

DO - You can help someone by:

- · Spending time talking about their experiences
- · Indicating that you've noticed a change in their behaviour
- · Letting them know you're there to listen without being judgmental
- · Suggesting they see a doctor or mental health professional
- Assisting them to make an appointment and/or going with them to see a doctor or mental health professional
- · Asking how their appointment went
- Talking openly about depression and assisting them to find information
- Encouraging them to exercise, eat well and become involved in social activities
- Keeping in touch and encouraging close friends and family to do the same.

DON'T - It's unhelpful to:

- · Pressure them to 'snap out of it', 'get their act together' or 'cheer up'
- · Stay away or avoid them
- · Tell them they just need to stay busy or get out more
- Pressure them to party more or wipe out how they're feeling with drugs or alcohol
- · Assume the problem will just go away.
