PROBUS TOO GOOD THIS YEAR

Our Year 10 debating team was unsuccessful this year in retaining the trophy for the annual debate against Wingham Probus Club.

The debate was held on Wednesday August 28th and the topic was “that teenagers have a lot to learn from the older generation.” It was a lively debate and once again the topic lent itself to the traditional swapping of humorous insults based on the generation gap.

Probus argued the Affirmative. Their line was that the older generation have had the experiences, the successes and the mistakes to teach teenagers much about life. First speaker Keith Bedggood laid an excellent foundation for their case and used quotes effectively eg Mark Twain: his father had learned so much in the seven years when he (Mark) was between 14 and 21 years old.

Our Year 10 debaters, in arguing the Negative, said that the world has changed so drastically in recent times that the experience and knowledge of the older generation was no longer relevant. Technology was central to their case but they also argued that the older generation was not very well qualified to pass on advice, given they started two world wars, generated the worst economic depression in history and had abused the environment beyond repair.

The traditional insults flowed. Jorj Sumpner-Johnston described the oldies’ music as “torture”. Darcy Byrne described the older generation as “technologically impaired” and Samantha Deal declared that the only technology the oldies really understood was hearing aids. For their part, the Probus team gave as good as they got.

Probus won the debate because their arguments landed as solid blows, whereas the WHS debaters were jabbing a lot and not following through. Probus were also more eloquent in their speaking, with Robyn Gibson delivering an outstanding presentation. Third speaker Alan Hughston wrapped up the case nicely, focussing on the stereotyped case put forward by the Negative.

The perpetual trophy is being engraved and the debate will be on again next year – a great activity in school/community relations.

IF YOUR CHILD HAS ANAPHYLAXIS SHOULD HE OR SHE CARRY THEIR OWN EPIPEN® OR ANAPEN® TO AND AT SCHOOL?

What is this article about?

If you have told the school that your child is diagnosed a risk of anaphylaxis you should have received a letter from Mr Thomson.

This article provides more information about anaphylaxis.

What is an EpiPen® and an Anapen®?

EpiPen® and Anapens® are the emergency treatment for children who are having an anaphylactic reaction.

What is anaphylaxis?

Anaphylaxis is a severe and sometimes sudden allergic reaction. If your child has been diagnosed by a doctor as being at risk of anaphylaxis there are some important things to remember that will help the school to support your child's health care needs.

Why you need to keep us informed if your child is diagnosed as being at risk of anaphylaxis or if his or her condition changes. This includes if they have an anaphylactic reaction while not at school.

The school can only respond to risks it knows about. Please keep Wingham High School informed so that we can plan to support your child at school.

Why you need to provide the school with your child's current ASCIA Action Plan for Anaphylaxis and an EpiPen® or Anapen® signed by their doctor

The plan sets out the steps the school needs to follow in an emergency. It is essential for us to have this to keep your child safe.

We will keep a copy of your child's ASCIA Action Plan for Anaphylaxis stored with your child's EpiPen® or Anapen®.

Why it is important to talk regularly with your child about some simple steps to help keep them safe

It is important to regularly talk with your child about when and where they are at risk of contact with the things they are allergic to and how to avoid this. If you have told them not to take part in sharing food at school, regularly remind them of this.

Reassure them that if they do come into contact with something they are allergic to or they feel unwell at school they won't get into trouble. **They need to tell a teacher immediately.**

Consider whether your child should carry their own EpiPen® or Anapen®

If your child has been diagnosed with anaphylaxis you can request that they carry their own EpiPen® or Anapen® to school and at school. A request form has been sent home and is also available from (INSERT LOCATION/PERSON).

If you request that your child carry an EpiPen® or Anapen® with them to school and at school you will still need to provide the school with at least one additional EpiPen® or Anapen® for storage in a central location within the school and for access by staff in an emergency.

The school will contact you about any request you make for your son or daughter to carry their own EpiPen® or Anapen®.

Why does the school need to know if your son or daughter is carrying their own EpiPen® or Anapen®?

Staff need to know your child carries an EpiPen® or Anapen® in an emergency. For this reason this information will be included in your child's individual health care plan.

They also need to be able to find it quickly so it is important that it be in an easily identifiable and accessible spot (eg. not a locker).

PAPILLOMAVIRUS (HPV) VACCINE

- 2012, the Australian Government announced that human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine would be provided free to male students in high schools from 2013.
- From 2013, males in Year 7 in all NSW high schools will be offered HPV vaccine annually.
- In addition, males in Year 9 will be offered the vaccine as part of the national 'catch up' program in 2013 and 2014.
- Males who are 14-15 years of age in 2013 and who are in Year 10 can receive free HPV vaccine at their GP during 2013 only:
 - It is important when making the GP appointment that the receptionist is informed of the reason for the visit and that sufficient time is allowed for the vaccine to be ordered and delivered to the GP.
 - HPV vaccination will continue to be offered annually to female students in Year 7 only.
 - The Australian Government has developed information for parents, students and health professionals about HPV vaccination.
