Meat Judging





ESSAY BY JONTY HEMMINGWAY

Australian agriculture is a vital part of our economy now and in the future and with a growing population both nationally and globally the need for more sustainable ways to feed the world is necessary. The global population is expected to rise to around 9.1 billion by 2050, and to compensate for that food production worldwide will need to increase by 70%. Most of this increase in demand is coming from countries in our own region, especially China and India, so Australian farmers are well placed to contribute to the challenge and capitalise on the commercial opportunities and the rise of new markets.

There is tremendous potential for increase in the output of Australia agriculture. This is because we have a vast land area and the potential to increase yields with improvements in technology and science. Genetic engineering, more efficient machinery and scientific equipment, smarter, more sustainable farming methods and increased productivity due to 'smarter' farming and tailored breeding plans are examples of this. In 2010 Australian farmers used 7.3% less land then they did in 1950, while producing 220% more. With the expansion of the population, the availability of farmland does not, so innovation and productivity will need to continue to increase. Australia's farmers have a long history of embracing new technologies and innovative practices, with strong productivity growth as a result, so it is vital that it continues to improve to help feed the world's growing population.

The challenge of maintaining the adequacy and affordability of global food supplies will likely become more pressing over time, and with that Australia's role as a net food exporter will be critical. "In 2009, Australian farms produced 93% of the total volume of food consumed in Australia. After catering for the needs of the Australian population, 60% of Australia's farm produce was exported, helping feed some 40 million people outside Australia each day." Agricultural produce has constantly been among Australia biggest export commodities, with the value of this export growing over three decades from \$8.2 billion to \$32.5 billion. With Australian farming set to improve and become more productive than it already is the

export of food to growing countries will play a vital role in Australia's economy in years to come, especially with the slowing of the mining industry.

It's our farmers that sustain our way of life and help ensure the economy of the nation. A recent white paper 'Australian in the Asian Century' suggests that our agricultural sector will be transformed due to the changes occurring in Asia, and lists that "Australian food producers will be recognised globally as innovative and reliable producers of more and higher quality food and agricultural products, services and technologies to Asia." From developing innovative techniques to wisely using the land, Australia's agriculturists are leading the world in the science of farming, sustainability and productivity.

WINGHAM HIGH PRODUCTION




The play "Romeo and Juliet ... Summer of 66 " adapted from the original work of Shakespeare by Drama teacher Merilyn Kendall had its opening performance in the Wingham High School multi-purpose centre. Set in a circus, the two warring families of The Beatles and The Rolling Stones do their best to create havoc only to find that Romeo Beatle and Juliet Stone decide to make "beautiful music" together. The end is disastrous for Romeo, Juliet and their friends but a lesson for their families who realise that fighting is not the way to solve problems.

Student directors Madelyn McKay and Courtney Smith worked with a

team of 110 actors, musicians, dancers, cheer leaders, crew and technicians for six weeks to produce the final performance which was warmly received by audiences alike.

During the final two weeks leading up to the public performances students spent all day rehearsing while some made costumes and props, painted sets, create T shirts, wrote a daily newspaper, took photographs and made a movie of the rehearsals and the final





performance. A full dress and technical rehearsal was carried

out on Monday night before the public performances.

"Apart from creating the final product the object of the production is to engage students in a real life activity" said Mrs Kendall. They contact other schools by letter, email and phone and converse with people in the community regarding their particular section of the production. "They learn to take initiative and solve problems while taking responsibility for their actions and work as a team with students from other year groups" she said.

This year the play required the students to research the 1960s so attention to detail of hair, make-up and costume was particularly important. Mrs Rachel

Bloomfield assisted the students in the application of make-up and hair styles and said the students were extremely knowledgeable about the era and well organised in their approach. It was evident by the comments from the audience that they had achieved the desired effect.

Music of the Beatles and The Rolling Stones was beautifully scored by Music teacher/producer Mrs Stacey Harrell and the calibre of the students' singing and playing was exceptional. A junior technical team was assisted and tutored by Hamish McDonald of Paradyme Studios and their experiment with back lighting created an effective silhouetted scene.

Wingham community supported the performance by selling tickets, McKeough's Betta Electrical, and attending the shows. Wingham High School is the only school in the Manning to create a production on an annual basis and offering such a rich opportunity to its students.



Joel Wins Rotary Public Speaking Competition



Joel Hedge, Year 12, recently continued Wingham High's winning tradition at the local/cluster level of the annual Rotary Public Speaking competition.

On Monday November 25th at Club Taree, Joel defeated speakers from Taree High, St Clare's, Gloucester High and both campuses of Great Lakes College. Each of the six speakers gave a five minute speech on a topic of their choice, with the only requirement being that they had to include one or more elements of the Four



Way Rotary Test. Each speaker was sponsored by their local Rotary club.

Joe's winning speech was stunning in its depth of content and in Joel's expert delivery. The adjudicators from Taree Toastmasters - Philip Thornton and Robert Weller- described the speech as sublime; advanced in its concept and ideas, and outstanding in its content. They said that Joel had taken the element of speaking to a new level in the contest with his extemporaneous delivery and expert use of pause, vocal variety, gestures and body language.

Titled "An Alternative to Apathy", Joel's speech advanced the thesis that it was not apathy that causes talented young people to become disengaged with leadership and political processes. Rather, he said, there were political, cultural and social barriers placed in front of youth today that turned them away. He cited examples from the political party system, the media and the myths surrounding the notion of heroism.

The next round of the competition will be held at Walcha in February where Joel will face seven other competition winners from the North West and North Coast regions. At that level of the competition, as well as the prepared speech, the speakers will have to deliver a two minute impromptu speech. From

there, the top four speakers will face off in the final, with the winner receiving an all-expenses paid trip to New Zealand, sponsored by Rotary International.

Mr Dunbier, our debating and public speaking coach, believes that Joel will definitely be there in the final and he has the skills to go all the way to New Zealand.

SISTASPEAK

SistaSpeak was a series of mentor-supported workshops for our Aboriginal girls in Years 7-10. The aim of the workshops was to support and inspire the students to pursue their education, examine career options and work towards financial independence. It is also aimed at increasing their self-esteem, and to strengthen their sense of identity, culture and connection to community.

All the workshops, including excursions had specific learning objectives and were designed to continually reinforce positive aspects of the girls throughout the program.

An important part of this program was working with Indigenous role models who provided the girls with examples of the diversity for possible careers and highlight options which they may not have otherwise been aware of.

Some of our workshops and activities included a visit to Boutique on Bella in Isabella Street Wingham, where owner Brooke Yarnold, a former student, gave up her time and provided a workshop for the girls. Brooke shared her story and spoke in depth to the girls about the importance of good skin care, careers in the beauty industry and applying makeup.

Mrs Shirley Clissold, Careers advisor, held a talk with the girls where we covered topics such as appropriate clothing for job interviews, resumes and the many career choices available to them.

We took to the trees at the Tree Top Adventure Park in Newcastle for a day of physical and mental challenges. The girls faced their fears and worked together to challenge and achieve things they never thought they could. Great teamwork, courage and confidence were shown by all the girls.

Our last day was spent at Saltwater where the girls were led in a cultural talk and walk by Nardja Davies from the National Parks and Wildlife Yun yi Barragay program. Nardja spoke with the girls in depth about the surrounding animals and plants and their uses and described how their life as an Aboriginal Woman in the past would have been.

After a BBQ lunch the girls were faced with another physical and mental challenge when they took on the waves with a Surfing Lesson from Saltwater Surf School. The smiles on their faces and the sound of laughter when they succeeded in standing up were a priceless moment for them the mentors, and the staff involved.
