Luke Bailey—Para World Athletics Championships Results

Former Wingham High student Luke Bailey visited school on Tuesday 19th November to speak about his experiences at the recent Para World Athletics Championships held in Dubai where he represented Australia.

The championships were held in Dubai in the country of United Arab Emirates. Luke competed in the T54 100m event. He finished second in his heat with a time of 14.44 seconds, just outside his PB of 14.31 seconds. His semi-final time of 14.44 seconds, identical to his heat time, claimed Luke 3rd position and a place in the final. In the final of the T54 100m Luke finished a very creditable 7th place, which is a tremendous result for a person of Luke's age.

Luke will now continue his training and compete in possibly three competitions to hopefully qualify him for the Tokyo Paralympics to be held in August-September of next year.

We wish Luke the best at the upcoming trials and look forward to seeing him back at school later in the year.

2020 School Uniform

From 2020 WHS uniform is:



The following items are **not acceptable**:

Board shorts, denim shorts, jeans, active-wear/tights, Items of clothing with large and obvious brand names, images promoting drugs or alcohol, canvas or mesh shoes, thongs and sandals.

I encourage any new uniform purchased be in line with stated 2020 changes.

There is a period of **up to three years** where we can have a 'change over' to our new school uniform style. This is for those who still fit their 'old uniform' only and does not include anything that never was uniform. (eg: black!)



To all new Parents, Carers, Grandparents, Aunts, Uncles and Friends,

My name is Judy Fowler and I am the canteen superviser at Wingham High School. The school's P&C runs the canteen, therefore, any profit goes back to the school. As with most canteens, ours relies heavily on volunteer contribution so we are always on the lookout for new helpers.

Most of our volunteers come in once a month, either for a couple of hours in the morning or until lunch is over. These great helpers enjoy a free morning tea and lunch and a fun time in the canteen. It's always a bit of a laugh and a good way to meet new people. Duties include food preparation, stocking fridges etc, but you are not required to handle money. A Volunteer Working With Children check is required to enable you to work in the canteen, but there is no cost involved and only one simple form to complete and return to me.

I enjoy watching parents become familiar with their child's teachers and friends. It's a great way to get to know more people at our school. Students love it when mum, dad, nan or pop are having a day at the canteen, although they may eat more than usual as they tend to book it up to you.

We are proud to advise that our canteen meets all the health regulations for a NSW High School and our menu has received the tick of approval from the NSW government so don't be concerned if your child wishes to buy lunch as we only have healthy options, even our slushie machine is 99% fruit juice.

You don't need to have a child at school to come and lend a hand, in fact I have more volunteers with no children than I do with kids here. So please, if you know of anyone in the community with some time to spare ask them to give me a call as I'm always happy to explain how our canteen works.

If your child has any dietary requirements that you would like to discuss, please call me or pop in to the school for a chat and a look through the canteen at any time.
