From the Principal's Desk

Welcome back to another school year, one that will be full of opportunity and resume to something closer to normal. That is very much my hope and optimistic outlook for 2022!

We have definitely started the year with a COVID cloud hanging above us once more and the added extra of Rapid Antigen Testing (RAT) being familiar language. What I have been pleased with is the resilience of our learning community getting on with business. It is fantastic achieving larger numbers in our year groups enabling, potentially, greater degree of educational choice and opportunities. There are plenty of staff with paperwork at the ready to provide greater scope of experience for students.

We also welcome some new staff and say goodbye to others for 2022.
















Careers News

The University Roadshow visited Wingham HS on Thursday 10th February featuring the University of New England, Southern Cross University, Charles Sturt University, University of Newcastle and Taree Universities Campus. Representatives from each of these universities spoke to 18 interested Year 12 students about the benefits of attending regional universities and pathways to university.

Year 12 were supposed to attend an excursion next week to the University of Wollongong. Unfortunately, this had to be postponed by UOW due to current COVID regulations. UOW are hoping to hold an on campus event later in the year.

There are lots of opportunities available to our students and therefore lots of information to disseminate. I give out relevant information at Year Meetings, through the Student Notices on Sentral, by email and Year 11 and 12 Facebook groups.

Our school subscribes to Study Work Grow (formerly known as mhscareers), a careers service which allows students or parents to be kept up to date with Careers News and Events. Newsletters are sent weekly to Year 12.

The school also has a Wingham Careers website which is <u>www.winghamcareers.com</u>. This service is provided by an external company and has lots of useful Careers information as well as templates for resumes and letters of application. Students need to register and can then access the Students Secure Area.

The rest of Term 1 and Term 2 are already shaping up to be busy with excursions to the Charles Sturt University Port Macquarie Campus on Tuesday 8th March, University of New England at Armidale on Friday 6th May and the University of Newcastle (date to be confirmed) for Year 12. There is also a Health Careers Forum Excursion on Tuesday 8th March to the University of Newcastle Department of Rural Health at Taree for interested students in Years 10/11/12.

Year 10 have a number of Careers events and information coming up. Work Experience lessons are scheduled for Week 6 with all of Year 10 so students are then welcome to start organising placements as convenient. Year 10 will be involved in subject selection interviews for their senior patterns of study during Term 2. Year 10 have the opportunity to participate in a Certificate I in Financial Literacy course – this is in partnership with the Smith Family

Best Start Year 7 Assessment

Year 7 students will participate in the Best Start Year 7 Assessment in Term 1, 2022.

Best Start Year 7 is an online literacy and numeracy assessment available to secondary schools that assesses key literacy and numeracy skills of Year 7 students. It is designed to assist teachers to identify students who may require additional support in developing their literacy and numeracy skills.

The 2022 assessment window is:

- 2 February to 4 March 2022 (Eastern Division Schools)
- 9 February to 11 March 2022 (Western Division Schools)

The purpose of the Best Start Year 7 assessment is to provide feedback to teachers to help identify student needs.

Feedback will be provided to teachers who may choose to share this with students, parents and carers during teacher interview processes.

Best Start Year 7 is just one of a range of assessments the school uses to assess students.

Thank you so much for your service to the school, Lorraine.






Introducing Future Focus - Building Resilience in our Students

Students in Year 8 will be participating in a strengths-based program during 2022, called Future Focus. We will be looking at areas of wellbeing based on a program called Second Step. The program is aimed at building resilience in young people, to help them manage the life challenges that are an inevitable part of growing up.

The Future Focus program is part of Wingham High School's commitment to understanding that teachers, in partnership with parents, have a significant role in promoting good mental health in their students. Future Focus will provide a range of skills to empower students to understand and care for their own wellbeing.

Our program will take on a strengths-based approach. Instead of focusing on negatives and things that don't work, it assists young people to focus on the unique characteristics and qualities they have, but are inclined to ignore or downplay. How often do your children comment on the things they can't do? A strengths-based approach does not require individuals to excel or perform in particular areas, but rather it encourages them to acknowledge and appreciate the small things they do in their everyday lives – such as being a good friend, being responsible and demonstrating small acts of kindness that reflect underlying valuable qualities. The program also encourages young people to develop good help-seeking skills for themselves and others, so they can obtain assistance if challenges are too difficult for them to manage alone.

Many of the activities will give students the opportunity to practice breaking down their thoughts in the following way:



In Semester 2, the Future Focus program will be using a Project Based Learning model to allow students to work individually and cooperatively with their peers to develop their ability to build relationships and enhance their connection to school. These are vital elements to improving your child's sense of self and belonging. Parents and guardians are encouraged to discuss the lessons at home with their children so that all students understand that the significant people in their lives have an important part to play in their wellbeing.

HSC Minimum Standard Tests

Year 10 students will sit for the Minimum Standards Tests on Thursday the 24th of February 2022

HSC minimum standard Information for parents and carers

What is the HSC minimum standard?

The HSC minimum standard was created to help ensure that students have the key literacy and numeracy skills for life after school. Students in New South Wales will need to demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the HSC credential from 2020.

The HSC minimum standard is set at level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF). These skills are essential for everyday tasks and learning after school such as writing a letter for a job application or understanding a mobile phone plan.

The standard is assessed through online tests across three areas: reading, writing and numeracy.

The minimum standard online tests are 45 minutes long and include a multiple choice reading test, a multiple choice numeracy test and a short writing test based on a choice between a visual or written prompt.

Examples of the tests are available on the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) website. Practice tests are available for students to sit at school to help them become familiar with the online test structure and for schools to help determine student readiness to meet the minimum standard.

Who needs to complete HSC minimum standard online tests?

Students who complete the HSC in 2020:

- Students who are completing the HSC in 2020 and achieved a Band 8 or above in Reading, Writing and Numeracy in their 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN results, do not need to sit the NESA HSC minimum standard online test.
- Students who did not achieve a Band 8 in any one of the 3 areas of their 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN, but who have subsequently sat and achieved level 3 in the corresponding HSC minimum standard online tests in 2018 or 2019, have met the standard.
- Students who did not achieve a Band 8 in any one of the 3 areas of their 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN, and have not yet sat the HSC minimum standard online tests must sit the tests in 2019, 2020 or during the first few years after school.

HSC minimum standard - Information for parents and carers

Students who will complete the HSC in 2021 and beyond:

All students must sit the NESA HSC minimum standard online tests in reading, writing and numeracy.

When can students take the HSC minimum standard online tests and who will administer them?

Students will have four opportunities per year to sit the HSC minimum standard online tests in each area of Reading, Numeracy and Writing, in Year 10, 11 and 12.

Students are required to wait at least 30 calendar days before re-attempting a test in the same domain.

Please note: in 2020, NESA has increased the chances Year 12 students have to sit the minimum standard online tests. Students yet to meet the HSC minimum standard will be able to attempt each test up to six times in 2020, with 14 calendar days between re-attempts. Students in Years 10 and 11 continue to have four chances a year to sit each test.

The tests must be administered by schools via a lockdown browser.

Students will also have up to 5 years from the time they start their first HSC course to sit the minimum standard online tests.

Disability provisions and exemptions:

Students with additional learning needs may be eligible for extra provisions for the minimum standard online tests or be exempt from meeting the HSC minimum standard in order to receive their HSC. Parents should contact the school to find out more information.

Life Skills courses are designed to provide an equitable pathway to the HSC. Students taking four or more Life Skills courses can be exempt from meeting the HSC minimum standard. Please contact your school for more information.
